Proposed Expansion of Water Reservoir in Bridle Trails State Park Loretta Lopez

Several members of the BTCC met with the City on rainy February 14 to walk the area near the Pike's Peak Water Reservoir and discuss the proposed expansion project with the City. The City's position is that the City needs to expand the water reservoir to provide water for the Bel-Red area (now known as the Spring District) and the Central Business District (CBD). The BTCC Board's position is that the City should not cut 80 to 100 trees to build a bigger reservoir in beautiful Bridle Trails State Park. Congregations for the Homeless Nancy Bennett

Congregations for the Homeless has leased the home located at 2624 127th Ave NE in the Cherry Crest neighborhood for a five year term. The organization rents rooms in the home to men that were previous occupants of a Bellevue shelter for 30% of each person's income.

Many of this home's neighbors have concerns regarding this type of use in an area zoned for single family residences. The City of Bellevue's position on this use is this group facility as described by Congregations for the Homeless (6 persons in a supervised program renting the home) is permitted in a residential neighborhood because it meets the City's adopted definition of family. The City challenged the definition of a "family" in federal district court Children's Alliance v. City of Bellevue, 950 F. Supp. 1491 (W.D. Wa. 1997). In that case, federal district court held that the City's dispersion requirements and limit on the number of residents in certain zones violated state and federal housing law by imposing conditions on group facilities for children that are not placed on other family homes. The City was required to repeal its group home regulations. Since that required Code change, there is no Bellevue regulation that might limit these homes any differently than other family homes.
