PSE Energize Eastside Project- Members of Eastside Community Advisory Group Submit Dissenting Report

On December 19, a Dissenting Report was submitted to Puget Sound Energy (PSE) by seven Neighborhood Community Advisory Group (CAG) Representatives and the City of Newcastle. Community Development Director and (CAG) Representative. The report challenges PSE's stance that the \$200M Energize Eastside project is the most cost-effective way to meet the future electrical needs of the Eastside. The Dissenting Report also noted that the CAG Final Report does not represent the wishes of the community.

Only one-quarter of the voting members represented neighborhoods and many affected neighborhoods had no representation at all.

Earlier, on Dec 10, the Puget Sound Energy's (PSE) Community Advisory Group (CAG) made their final route recommendations for the proposed New Transmission Line. Both routes are located through the middle of Bridle Trails along the existing 115,000 Volt line along the 136th Avenue NE block.

PSE will now review and decide a final route by February 2015.

The City of Bellevue has hired an Independent Technical Consultant to assess the Eastside electrical need, purpose and timing. This study is expected to be complete in February and will determine further action including the start of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to evaluate other alternatives that may satisfy the need with less intrusion into the neighborhoods.

CENSE (Coalition of Eastside Neighborhoods for Sensible Energy) is working with Bellevue to offer community input regarding the Independent Technical Consultant study. See CENSE.org for latest news.

Your civic watchdog. BTCC volunteers monitor land use and zoning activities and alert authorities when safety and traffic concerns are raised.

BTCC has been very active with the PSE
Energize Eastside project, including a seat
on the PSE Citizens Advisory Group
(CAG). We support the Coalition of
Eastside Neighborhoods for Sensible Energy (CENSE) in its efforts to develop an unbiased evaluation of the project. There is also
continuing dialogue with the City of Bellevue.

Our volunteers were active in the Sound Transit site selection process and were instrumental in helping avoid the Plaza 520 site (Northup and 130th). We remain active with Sound Transit as the selected site is developed and will work to mitigate the impact of the site. Efforts to improve electrical reliability in the Bridle Trails community continue (Yes, this is a challenge!).

Liaison with the City of Bellevue.
BTCC representatives have long standing positive relationships with key persons at the City as well as City Council members. BTCC volunteers have good rapport with city leaders and are recognized as credible voices. We are also working with the city's comprehensive plan process, particularly where those plans include Bridle Trails.

New Parks.

The new Bridle Trails Corner Park at 24th and 132nd, is complete (look for a grand opening in the spring). BTCC was a strong partner in helping acquire and develop this park. The City has acquired land for another new park at 4432 140th Ave NE. BTCC has an active role in the acquisition and development of this 2nd park (development plans are in process).

Communication.

This newsletter is an example of BTCC communication – your membership helps us produce and distribute the newsletter. We also maintain the BTCC website and issue Rover email alerts. BTCC general meetings (financed by your membership) are an excellent source of information about our community and incorporate speakers on key topics of interest. Please plan to attend the meetings – they are informative and offer an opportunity to answer some of your questions.

Interested in How the Bellevue Police Department Operates?

The Bellevue Police Department is now accepting applications for the 2015 spring Community Police Academy, a 12-week program for Bellevue residents and those who work in Bellevue to become acquainted with how their police department operates.

On completion of the academy, graduates will have gained a better understanding of the law enforcement role in the criminal justice system, and an appreciation for the many challenges facing law enforcement in today's complex society.

The Academy is a primarily classroom-based, and the lessons provide hands-on learning about law enforcement. Topics covered include patrol procedures, firearms, 911 communications, narcotics, K-9, major crimes investigations, major accident investigations, defensive tactics, and hostage negotiations.

To participate, you must be willing to commit to attend the three-hour sessions which will be every Thursday night, 7-10 p.m., starting March 5 and ending on May 21.
